PETRONAS TWIN TOWERS & KUALA LUMPUR CITY CENTRE PARK

No trip to Kuala Lumpur is complete without seeing the iconic Petronas Twin Towers—the world's tallest twin skyscrapers. Striking by day and stunning when lit up at night, the towers offer sweeping city views from their Observation Deck and Skybridge.

At the base lies KLCC Park, a 50-acre green space with over 70 tree species, wide lawns, a rubberised jogging track, and the impressive Lake Symphony, featuring daily musical water fountain shows.



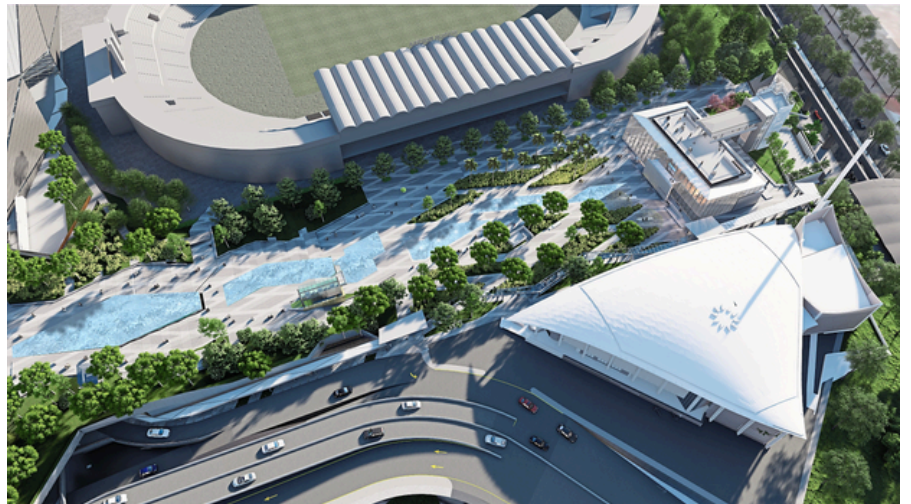
MERDEKA 118

Standing as the second-tallest building in the world, Merdeka 118 towers above Kuala Lumpur, overtaking even the Petronas Twin Towers. This prominent landmark was also featured in Marvel Studios' *Thunderbolts*, recently released in May 2025.

Head to *The View at 118*, the highest observation deck in Southeast Asia—for breathtaking panoramic views.

For thrill-seekers, the “Edge Walk” offers a heart-pounding outdoor stroll at dizzying heights, with a spire climb for the adventurous.

At the base, the 118 Mall offers shopping, dining, and entertainment in a sleek, modern setting.





BUKIT BINTANG SHOPPING DISTRICT

Bukit Bintang, Kuala Lumpur's Golden Triangle, is a vibrant hotspot full of trendy shops, popular malls like Pavilion Kuala Lumpur, Lot 10, and Sungai Wang Plaza, and everything in between.

By night, the district comes alive with bars, nightclubs, and delicious street food along Jalan Alor. Don't miss the BBQ chicken wings, satay, curry laksa, or indulge in chilli crab and oyster omelettes for a true local flavour.





CENTRAL MARKET, PETALING STREET, KWAI CHAI HONG

For a taste of old Kuala Lumpur, visit Central Market, home to over 350 shops selling traditional goods, local handicrafts, and unique souvenirs like Borneo pearls, wau bulan (Malay kites), and batik.

Just a short walk away is Petaling Street, or Chinatown, where you can explore the lively markets. Be sure to check out Kwai Chai Hong, a hidden alley with murals showcasing the area's rich history.



MASJID NEGARA MALAYSIA

As Malaysia's largest mosque, Masjid Negara can accommodate up to 15,000 worshippers. Located near Kuala Lumpur's historic railway station and the Islamic Arts Museum, it's an elegant example of modern Islamic architecture. Remember to dress modestly when visiting this sacred site.



KUALA LUMPUR BIRD PARK

Just a short walk from the National Mosque, the Kuala Lumpur Bird Park is a vibrant haven where birds roam freely in naturalistic aviaries. Perfect for photography, you'll capture everything from colourful parrots to eye-catching peacocks.



TAMAN TUGU – URBAN FOREST

Within walking distance from the KL Bird Park, Taman Tugu is a 66-acre urban forest park offering scenic hiking trails for all ages, rest areas with drinking water, and scheduled weekend activities for visitors to enjoy.





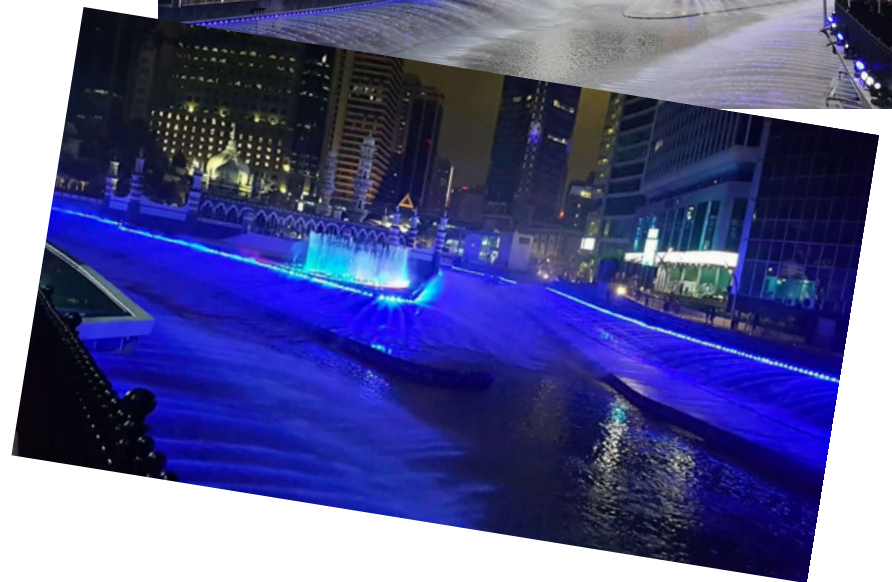
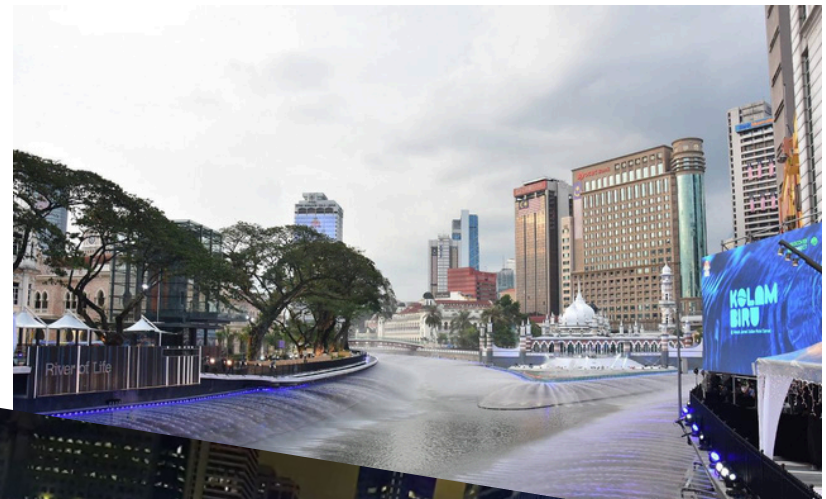
DATARAN MERDEKA AND SULTAN ABDUL SAMAD BUILDING

Visit Dataran Merdeka, where the nation's flag was first raised in 1957. Across the square, admire the Sultan Abdul Samad Building, a colonial-era landmark with Moorish architecture and a clock tower inspired by London's Big Ben.

RIVER OF LIFE

Once ranked among the world's top ten waterfronts, the River of Life is now a lively hub with cafés, bike paths, and landscaped gardens. At night, watch the river glow blue during the light and music show, set against an atmospheric backdrop of the city's oldest mosque, Masjid Jamek.

For the full experience, join a Kuala Lumpur night tour that includes the Lake Symphony and more. Be sure to check showtimes in advance.





BATU CAVES

Just 13km north of Kuala Lumpur, Batu Caves is a must-see attraction, famous for its towering rainbow-coloured stairs.

These 272 steps lead to beautiful limestone caves, offering a rewarding climb and incredible views.

A favourite spot for both nature lovers and Instagrammers alike.



ROYAL SELANGOR VISITOR CENTRE

Experience pewter at its finest at Royal Selangor, where you can admire exquisite pieces and explore the history of the tin rush in colonial Malaya. Founded in 1885, Royal Selangor remains the maker of the world's finest pewter.



JADI BATIK GALLERY

A must-visit for batik enthusiasts, this one-stop centre in KL offers live batik demonstrations and invites visitors to create their own batik masterpiece in a hands-on class.

PETALING STREET/CHINA TOWN

Merchant's Lane – Asian-inspired comfort dishes and unique beverages like rose honey milk and jasmine-infused black coffee

Old China Cafe – Peranakan food. Try out their beef rendang or Nyonya Pai Tee!

Concubine KL – Restaurant and Bar. Here you'll find great cocktails and Asian small plates.

PS150 – Cocktail bar housed in a pre-war shop lot situated next to a tiny stationery shop sitting under the popular cafe, Merchant's Lane.

SURIA KLCC

Cili Kampung – A local Malay restaurant brand that is renowned for its authentic homemade Malay flavours

Madam Kwan's – Malaysian cuisine. Try the nasi lemak (breakfast for champs) and cendol for dessert!

BUKIT BINTANG

Grandmama's – Serves Malaysian local cuisines such as nasi lemak, Chicken rice, Fried kueh teow, Curry fish head, Hakka fried rice – just how grandma used to make it!

The Rabbit Hole – Housed within a colonial building with sleek décor. Café by day, bar by night!
